

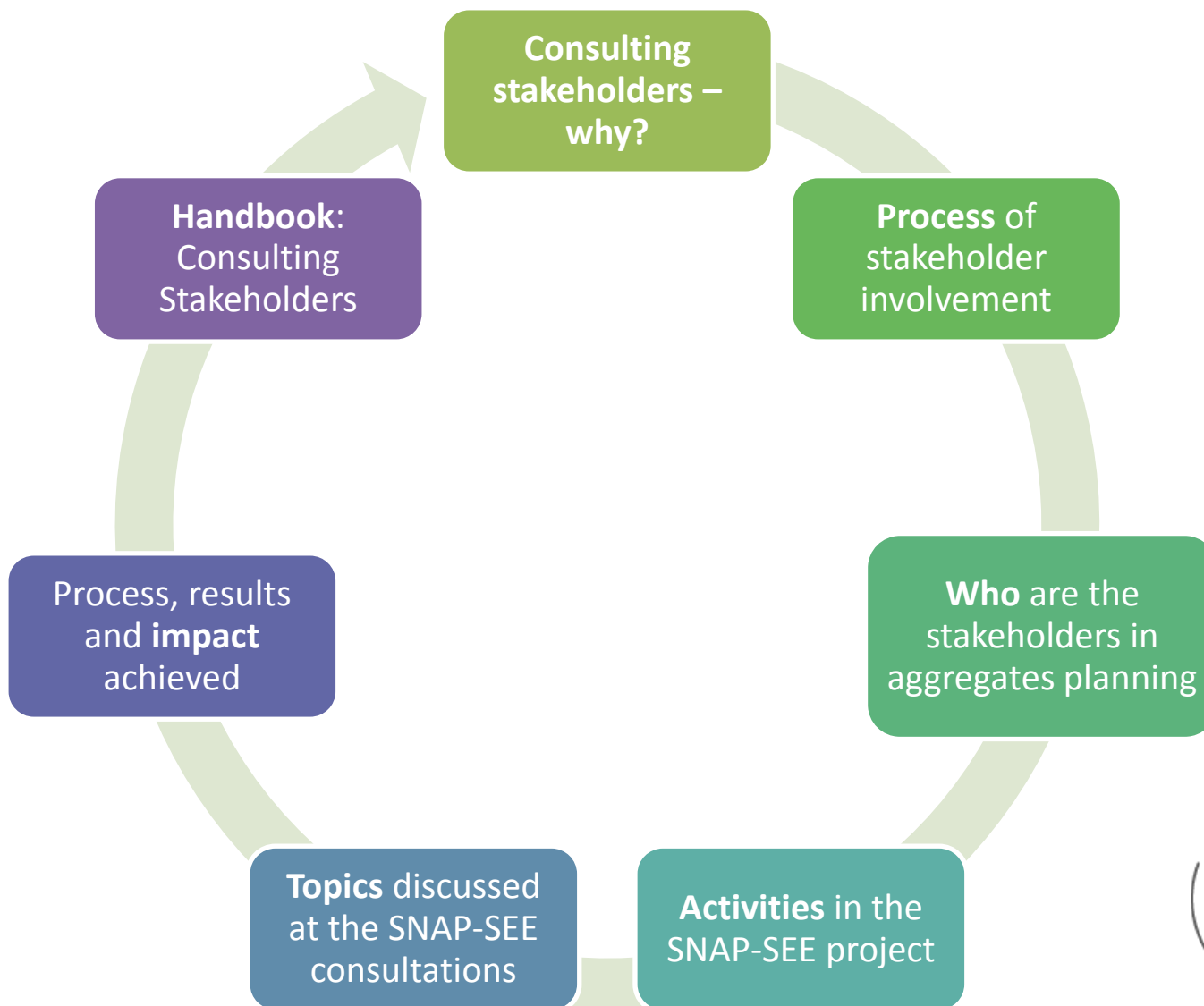

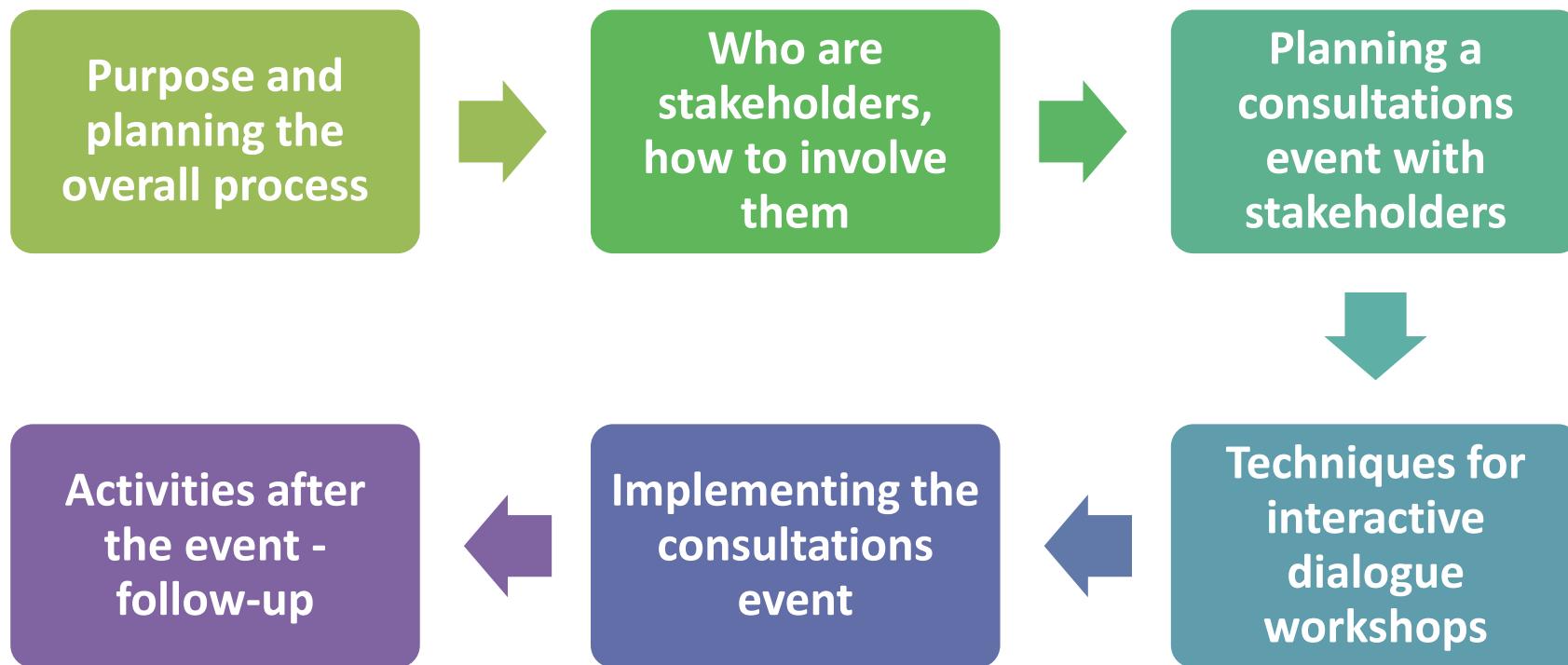


CONSULTING STAKEHOLDERS – WHY?

- **to enhance cooperation** between sectors, target groups, administrative levels, organisations: e.g. mining, environment, water, land use planning, transport etc. and at different levels (national, regional, local).
- **to increase awareness, motivation and/or interest about the importance of aggregates planning** (even when expected differently)
- **to identify the need for preparing the national minerals policy and/or plans**
- **to analyse existing situation and key obstacles** in the planning process (e.g. procedures, illegal quarrying, lack of awareness etc.)
- **to look for and assess suggestions for solutions** that are acceptable for the majority of involved groups
- **to achieve win-win situation**



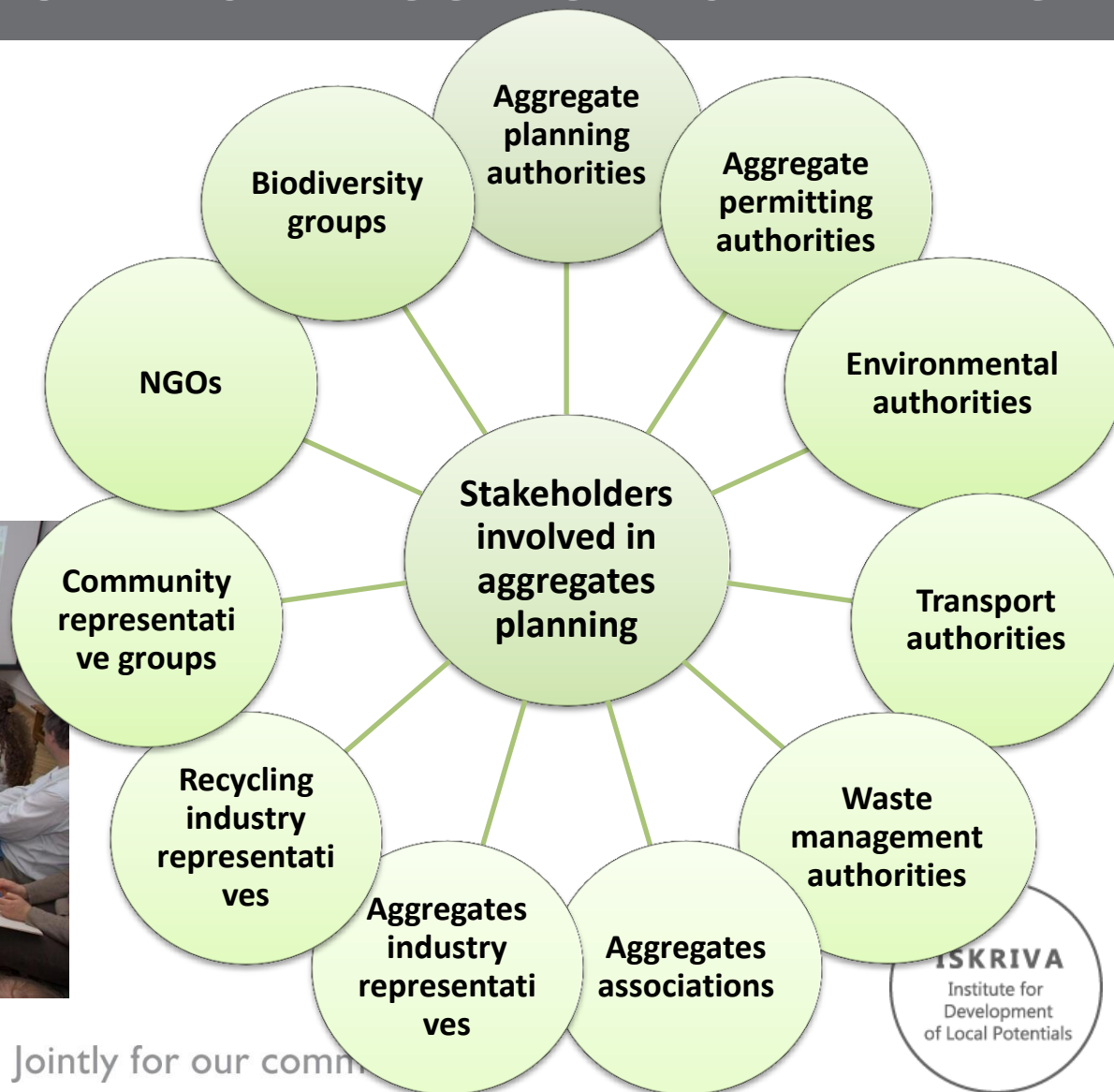
PROCESS OF STAKEHOLDER INVOLVEMENT

SNAP-SEE STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATIONS

- 22 consultation workshops in 11 countries
- Over 900 participants from 80 different organisations
- Representatives of all target groups
- Capacity building presentations, discussion, interactive workshops ...



Consultations in Slovenia

TOPICS DISCUSSED AT THE SNAP-SEE CONSULTATIONS

- **Current state of planning**; what are issues, bottlenecks, gaps?
- **Who is in charge** for aggregates planning? Cooperation between authorities?
- What are **the procedures** like? Are they too slow? If yes, why?
- **Key obstacles** as seen by the industry, NGOs, local communities
- What are the **suggestions** to overcome these obstacles?
- Can **cases from other countries** be used to solve the problems?
- Which **solutions** should be implemented, under which conditions, by whom, in what time frame?

OVERALL PROCESS, RESULTS AND IMPACT ACHIEVED

Overall aim: achieving more sustainable supply of aggregates in my country/region

Outputs: multi-sectoral analysis of the current approach to aggregates planning; national/regional guidance on improving aggregates planning

Overall process for consulting stakeholders in the SNAP-SEE project

Purpose of the participation process:

- analyse existing situation in aggregates planning and look for solutions to overcome existing obstacles in cooperation with representatives of different target groups
- create a roadmap for developing aggregates policy or making it more sustainable, linking the supply from primary and secondary aggregates

Outcomes:

- better understanding of aggregates planning process and current limitations
 - agreement on solutions
- increased capacity on SARM and SSM concepts and good practices in other countries
- increased awareness of sustainable approaches
- increased knowledge of up-to date data and methods
